Stealing the Garments of the Unmarried Gopi Girls | 18 minutes

Story connection

Krishna Book Ch.22: Month-long Kātyāyanī vow by the Yamunā; garments taken and returned respectfully; Krishna's autumn promise; praise of charitable trees. Child-safe wording only—no naked or exposed bodies.

- Cards are shuffled on purpose.
- Number them 1–7 in true story order.



Krishna understands their hearts and gathers their garments from the bank.

Number + draw one detail



He promises they will meet Him again in the next autumn season.

Number + draw one detail



The unmarried gopī girls keep a month-long vow to Goddess Kātyāyanī.

Number + draw one detail



Later Krishna praises the charitable trees that give shade and fruit to others.

Number + draw one detail



The girls appeal politely for their clothes to be returned.

Number + draw one detail



Each morning they go to the Yamunā for worship and prayer.

Krishna returns the garments with care and dignity.
